

"Best practices" is often used as a cop out and to present methods that have no scientifically proven worth. "I used best practices, so I'm not responsible that Johnny can't read," If it's a "best" practice, then it is proven to be "best" ie. effective, by the best scientific research. Too often "best practices" either have no research foundation or are based on qualitative research rather than on rigorous scientific research. Section III is meaty and worth the read.
